Thanks to a FABULOUS and energetic crew of committee members and lots of "Friends", our committee accomplished more than we thought possible during the last year! We have been on our "Summer Break" since mid-June, and will start up again Friday mornings in September. Here are some of last season's highlights:

When walking past Tippie Lake, you will notice bubbles coming from four new aeration units. The bubbles are adding more oxygen to the water to aid in further restoring of the lakes' health.

A huge effort - 6 weeks of committee time and help from the bordering homeowners - went into removing the invasive Red Passion Vines that were choking out sunlight and several oaks in an area of Griffith Park. Maintenance of this area will be ongoing, as the vines are trying to make a comeback and air potatoes are also starting up.

We continued reclamation of Nutting-Green by clearing back the edges and spent more time on enhancing the trail entrances along with regular trail mowing and maintenance.

With the release of the Air Potato Leaf Beetle, we now have assistance battling the invasive air potatoes. You will notice lacy leaves on the plants where they are working. They were released in several areas, but have migrated quickly throughout the neighborhood. We will still need to pull vines and pick up potatoes, but hope to see a marked decrease in the coming years.

We haven't gotten any good pictures of the Bobcat lately but lots of people, dogs, rabbits, opossums and raccoons. We do move the camera around the hammock, so we might have missed the Bobcat.

We are thrilled to see the air potato beetles doing so well in the park! These little bugs are going to town on the potato vines. We are NOT spraying so that they have plenty to eat. As I keep saying this is a long term project for the beetles. We will continue to pick up the potatoes on the ground so we don't see new vines growing.

The committee members can now concentrate on removing other invasive plants like Brazilian pepper trees, Coral and Shoe button ardisias, and Java plum. We also continue removing some of the grape vines that are choking out the Saw Palmettos and small oak trees on the Live Oak path.

Upcoming projects are installing a bench in the parkland along Live Oak Road and replacing the plant ID tags that someone removed! I know we have been saying this for the past year, but hopefully we will get these projects done this fall!

We desperately need more help in the hammock! Maintaining the hammock and removing invasive plants takes a great deal of time. We all benefit from having all this green space, so should just a few people be responsible for its care? Be a good neighbor and say YES when the Nominating Committee calls asking for volunteers.

Air Potato Leaf Beetle (Lilioceris cheni)

As most of you know, the AHF released around 700 air potato beetles into some of the parks back in May. We are seeing the beetles in most parts of the village. That is why the AHF has stop distributing the free Round Up to residents as the beetle ONLY eats the potato vine. This is not a quick fix but will take several years for the beetles to do their job. I'm not even sure



that we will ever eradicate all the potatoes in the village. But, if we can get it down so that the committees can manage the spread of the air potato then in my opinion the beetles have done their job. Homeowners can apply for beetles for their own property and some residents have already released some.

The Florida Dept. of Agriculture is very easy to work with when obtaining the beetles. I filled out the paperwork for the AHF last fall and got a reply back from them pretty quick. They were quick to answer all my questions. The beetles are on a first come, first serve basis with priority to conservation land.


Here's some background on the beetles. They are released in the spring when the vines begin to grow. Their life cycle begins when the female lays eggs on the underside of air potato leaves. The females lay an average of 1800 eggs but in some cases up to 4300. After four days, eggs hatch and larvae begin feeding. When fully grown, larvae descend to the soil where they produce an oral secretion that hardens into a foam-like cocoon. Adults emerge after 12 to 16 days, and can live for five months or longer. The life cycle from egg to adult takes 30 days at 77 °F. Both adults and larvae feed on the air potato foliage.



The adult beetles are about 3/8 inch long and 3/16 inch wide. The wings are red, and

the abdomen, thorax, head, and legs are black. The adults leave large holes in the leaves as they eat. When the larvae feed, you will see leaves that looks like lace.

During the winter when the vines die down, the beetles drop down into the leafy material on the ground until spring. During this time they go without food. In the spring the females begin laying eggs and the cycle begins again.

The AHF is excited with the results that we are seeing. We encourage homeowners NOT to spray the potato vines. You can pick up the bulbs and dispose of the potato in your kitchen waste garbage...not your yard trash.

The Air Potato Leaf Beetle is an exotic species from China (red form) or Nepal (brown form) that has been introduced into Florida to help control the spread of the highly invasive Air Yam or Air Potato. It was first released in 2011 and it has thus far proven to be successful in reducing the height of the vines, decreased potato production, and the increase of competing native plants. Furthermore, it does not feed on other species in the genus, including the two native species in Florida. Adults lay eggs on the leaves and the larvae feed on the leaves and growing tips of the plants after hatching, reducing the ability of the plant to grow and expand quickly.

Pine Trees

I am becoming increasingly concerned about the condition of Melbourne Village's slash pine trees. About six months ago, I became aware of a large number of sick looking pines. Now I am seeing a lot of dead ones and a lot more sick ones. As long as I have lived here, I have never seen anything like it (I have lived here more than forty years). I think we have a real epidemic. Lyle Zody had said we have a problem with pine bark beetles here. Recently, my sister in California said she learned of an epidemic of pine bark beetles spanning the continent and had seen a picture on TV which showed an entire forest of pines in Yosemite National Park which were totally dead.

I would strongly recommend checking the pine trees in your yard. Look for thin clumps of pine needles and limbs with dead needles or none at all. A normal tree should look well filled out with lots of green pine needles mainly on the end of its limbs, especially where it gets a lot of sun (in deep shade, lower limbs tend to lose needles just because they don't get the sun to maintain them.

If you think you might have a problem, I would urge you to call the Brevard County Agricultural Extension Service and ask them to put you in contact with a tree expert who can help you. I have heard that an arborist would charge a rather hefty price for a checkup, but that if you can get hold of a biologist, if would be free. How true any of this is, I do not know. Whatever it takes, I would implore you to do it. Our town has a major problem that needs addressing. To have a lot of dead pines like we now do can make people think twice about living here, especially since preservation of our woodlands is what has made Melbourne Village so special. There is a spray that can help get rid of pine bark beetles, and yes, it is expensive, but our trees are so very worth it.

John 'Jack' Van Atta

John 'Jack' Van Atta, of 398 Dayton Blvd., passed away on Wednesday, May 13, 2015 at the age of 96. At the time of his passing, he was the oldest resident of Melbourne Village.

Jack and his wife of 59 ½ years, Marian Van Atta, moved to Melbourne Village in 1952. They were very active Village residents, and they were very influential in getting others to move to the Village.

Jack was preceded in death by his wife Marian in 2012 and daughter Patricia in 2013. He is survived by his son, William Van Atta, and Daughter-In-Law, Karen Van Atta, of Dayton Blvd.

AHF Committees

<u>ANNUAL MEETING COMMITTEE</u> is responsible for the preparation and programming of the Annual Meeting and any special meetings of the membership, including the Agenda, Mailing, Meeting Arrangements, Resolutions and Annual Dinner. The Annual Dinner is a catered affair held the day after the Annual Meeting. The themed dinner also includes entertainment.

<u>BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE</u> meets monthly and reviews the financial statements prepared by the bookkeeper. It insures that all expenditures comply with the by-laws and the budget. It prepares a budget which, after public review, is submitted to the Board of Trustees for adoption. It names the annual auditing committee.

BUILDING & GROUNDS COMMITTEE is responsible for the care, maintenance and beautification of the AHF village hall and surrounding property. The committee makes minor repairs and contracts for pest control. It also contracts for major repairs, such as air conditioning and roof, with the approval of the Board of Trustees. The committee works with the AHF Maintenance Technician for routine upkeep and cleaning. The parking lot and landscaping surrounding the building are the responsibility of the committee.

<u>HOUSE COMMITTEE</u> is charged with the interior of the AHF village hall in respect to supplies and kitchen readiness for the next event or hall rental.

<u>CODIFICATION COMMITTEE</u> is a committee of one which works with the executive secretary to ensure that all policy motions and directives of the Board of Trustees and membership meetings are properly indexed to form the continuing policy of the organization.

<u>CREDENTIALS</u> COMMITTEE determines the eligibility of those voting at membership meetings and mail ballots.

<u>TELLERS COMMITTEE</u> is responsible for the tally of any voting ballots.

<u>EDUCATION COMMITTEE</u> puts on a weeklong half-day summer camp for village youngsters. It also makes a recommendation to the Trustees for the Ruth B. Hayes scholarship award. The committee is empowered to sponsor other educational programs for the membership.

<u>SWIMMING POOL COMMITTEE</u> is responsible for the safe operation, maintenance, rules, and repairs of the pool and associated facilities. The committee is assisted during the week by the AHF Maintenance Technician.

<u>INFORMATION COMMITTEE</u> is charged with keeping the members informed about the events and news of the AHF. This is accomplished by the quarterly publication of a newsletter, The Villager, which is mailed to all members. The committee maintains the outdoor bulletin board on Dayton Blvd for current announcements, and it also maintains the AHF website.

<u>DEERHEAD HAMMOCK COMMITTEE</u> is entrusted with the care and preservation of the area first known as the 'little hammock.' It is the site for the Easter sunrise service and from time to time other gatherings such as weddings and memorial services. The committee meets monthly to pick up debris, remove invasive plants, and maintain the signage.

<u>ERNA NIXON HAMMOCK COMMITTEE</u> is entrusted with the care and preservation of the portion of the Erna Nixon Hammock in Melbourne Village. The committee meets monthly to keep the trails open, remove invasive plants, looks after the signage, and generally addresses the needs of the park.

<u>MEMORY GARDEN COMMITTEE</u> meets monthly to water, weed, mulch and tend the quasi-formal garden located near the Village Hall. The committee accepts monetary memorials which are used to add new plantings and enhance the appearance of the garden.

<u>PARKS AND PATHS COMMITTEE</u> meets weekly to maintain all the AHF park lands not covered by other committees. Tasks include clearing and trimming the paths and trails, removing invasive plants, selective mowing, and maintaining bridges and signs. A sub-committee, Friends of the AHF Garden, was officially added at the AHF Board of Trustees meeting on 8/14/2015.

<u>MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE</u> reviews new membership applications and interviews the prospective new members. In reality, its function is to welcome new members and introduce them to village life and their new neighbors.

<u>RECREATION COMMITTEE</u> is a busy group that plans and carries out events and activities for all age groups. Some recent events included an Easter egg hunt, Fourth of July parade, game nights, movie nights, Halloween party, Christmas dinner with Santa visit, flea market and holiday craft fair.

<u>NOMINATING COMMITTEE</u> has the responsibility of getting volunteers for each of the standing committees. These are submitted to the membership for acceptance at the annual meeting. The committee also nominates five members to fill the three Board of Trustee positions which come up for election each year.
